

Reason for Referral to Central Intake Definitions

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| Primary care for myself | General health doctor, family practitioner, health care provider/physician, medical home, etc... |
| Medical Home | is the home base for any child's medical and non-medical care. The medical home is a cultivated partnership between the patient, family and primary provider in cooperation with specialists and support from the community. |
| Primary care for my children | Pediatrician, Federally Qualified Health Center - FQHC, family practitioner, child's health care provider. |
| Prenatal care | a type of preventive healthcare with the goal of providing regular check-ups that allow doctors or midwives to treat and prevent potential health problems throughout the course of the pregnancy while promoting healthy lifestyles that benefit both the mother and child. |
| Prenatal care providers | Private Practice Obstetrician/Gynecologists (OB/GYN), Prenatal clinics |
| Prenatal Care practitioners | OB/GYN, Midwife, Family physicians |
| Public Benefits | Social Service assistance such as TANF - Temporary Assistance for Needy Families, SNAP – Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (formerly food stamps) and WIC – Women, Infants and Children (Special Supplemental Nutrition Program). |
| In-home parent support Home Visiting services: Parent Education and Support Parent/Child Activities Health Referrals | Evidenced based home visiting programs assign a home visitor/parent educator, nurse or family support worker to provide personalize health education and support during pregnancy. After the birth of the child; parent education, information and interactive parent child activities to support the healthy growth and development of children up to age of 3 years old, some programs up to 5 years old. Home visiting other services include developmental screening, linkages to health insurance, medical home, family goal setting, and much more. |
| Healthy Families | is a program designed to help expectant and new parents get their children off to a healthy start. (Enrolls pregnant women and children up to age 3 years old) |
| Nurse-Family Partnership | helps first-time moms to prepare for the birth of their child and gives them the support they need to support their child's growth and development. (Enrolls pregnant women up to 28 weeks) |
| Parents as Teachers | promotes the optimal early development, learning and health of children by supporting and engaging their parents and caregivers. (Enrolls pregnant women and children up to age 5 years old) |
| Assistance connecting to services (Community Health Workers) | Community Health Workers (CHW's) connect women to providers and services in their community. They conduct outreach in targeted neighborhoods, provide educational workshops and group activities; and offer case management services to women not currently connected to care and/or could use one on one support in navigating systems. |
| Group parent support (Family Success Centers) | Family Success Centers are a "one-stop" shop that provides wrap-around resources and supports for families before they find themselves in crisis. They offer primary and secondary child abuse prevention services to families and bring together concerned community residents, leaders and community agencies to address the problems that threaten the safety and stability of families and the community. |

Health Insurance Types Definitions

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| Medicaid PE | is a presumed status of eligibility before the application is fully processed and allows the child or parent to begin accessing their Medicaid benefits. |
| Medicaid MC | Medicaid offered through a managed care organization (MCO) eg. Horizon, Amerigroup, etc; |
| NJ FamilyCare | New Jersey's publicly funded health insurance program - includes CHIP, Medicaid and Medicaid expansion populations. That means qualified NJ residents of any age may be eligible for free or low cost health insurance that covers doctor visits, prescriptions, vision, dental care, mental health and substance use services and even hospitalization. |
| Medicare | health insurance for Americans aged 65 and older who have worked and paid into the system. It also provides health insurance to younger people with disabilities. |
| Commercial/Private | health insurance provided primarily through employer-sponsored plans. |
| Examples Include: | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Blue Cross and Blue Shield health insurance companies • Non-Blue commercial health insurance companies • Health Maintenance Organizations (HMO's) • Self-funded employer-sponsored benefit plans |
| Uninsured | a group of individuals who has no health insurance. |
| Self pay | A term used for a person who pays out of pocket for a health-related service in absence of insurance to cover the medical or surgical procedure performed. |

| Preconceptional Woman | A Female that has never been pregnant. |
| Interconceptional Woman | A Female previously pregnant and not currently pregnant. (It does not matter if the woman has children.) |

| Early Childhood Comprehensive System Grant (ECCS) / Help Me Grow (HMG) | is an early childhood systems integration initiative, working closely with state and local early childhood stakeholders ensuring a unified and coordinated approach to addressing the needs of pregnant women, infants and young children and their parents and families. |
